


But I believe the greatest find of the day goes to Anne and the 'Jackalope'!

A Mother's Intuition

My first car (1976) was a 1968 Oldsmobile Cutlass Supreme 4-door. The car had had a hard life before I got it, but it ran (after a fashion, warped heads did not hold the compression I might have hoped for) and I loved it. The car left my possession in 1978 and I went on to a succession of other cars, mostly Oldsmobiles, but just like your first love, you never forget your first car.

After high school, I was going to attend Michigan Technological University in Houghton, Michigan. Houghton is a ten hour car trip from Lansing, and my parents decided that I needed a new car to make my journey there as safely as possible. So as an early graduation present, they told me they would buy me a 1979 Oldsmobile Starfire. Needless to say I was as flabbergasted as I was excited about this development. I was able to order my new car, and we kept it as inexpensive as possible, getting the base car, with a 151 cu in Iron Duke engine and a 4-speed manual transmission. The only option I remember getting was the rear window defogger. It was Bright Blue Metallic with a blue cloth interior (I don't remember if the cloth was an option over the vinyl or not. It may have been) and I loved that car. In 1982 I got married, and my wife could not (and would not) drive a stick shift so my parents decided that for a wedding gift they would buy us a 1982 J-body Firenza with an automatic transmission. The Starfire was sold to a local used car dealer and sadly I never saw the car again.

The years and many Oldsmobiles came and went but in 1999 I bought my first Oldsmobile that was not a daily driver for me, My 1968 Cutlass S Convertible. Three years later, I bought an Oldsmobile to use as a daily driver, but my new (to me, only 12,000 miles on it) 1987 442 was just too nice to use as a daily driver and I ended up getting a Cutlass Ciera to do the dirty work. I really enjoyed my two Oldsmobile beauties and when I found a pair of 1968 license plates I registered the Cutlass with them and have driven it ever since on those plates. In 2012 the 442 became eligible to wear authentic plates and (thanks to Tom Walker) I found a plate that even had the numbers "442" on it and I was able to acquire a 1987 sticker for it. By 1987 the Michigan Blue plate special had been used for quite a few years and every year you just put a new sticker in the upper right hand corner (or somewhere else on the plate if you weren't too good at figuring that sort of thing out, a topic for a totally different rant). So both of my classics had authentic plates on them. The rules for authentic plates stated that the car could only be driven in parades and to and from car shows, but here in southeastern Michigan, there is a local car show every night of the week somewhere close, so I felt I could drive one of them to work if I felt like it and if I got pulled over for driving with authentic plates I could always claim that after work I was going straight to a car show.

I love driving my Cutlass and my 442, but always in the back of my mind was my 1979 Starfire. I decided it was time to go looking for one. I had been sort of looking since about 2004, but nothing had fallen into my lap, so nothing had come of it. By 2011 I had saved up enough money to buy one, if only I could find one.

I had some requirements that made one hard to find. First, it had to be a manual transmission, second it had to be a V-6 or V-8, third it had to have A/C (as I get older I find I want comfort). I was originally looking for a 1979 model, but over time became conflicted. I really liked the looks of the rear of the '79 - '80 models with the vertical tail lights, but realized that I liked the front end of the '77 - '78 models with the slanted grill and quad headlights. So in the end I decided that the looks of the front end outweighed the looks of the rear end and I decided that what I wanted was a 1978 Starfire Firenza or GT. I began my hunt in earnest, finding cars of all different conditions at all different price points. I knew that I did not want a basket case or a car that needed a complete restoration. I wanted a car that was in very good condition, but still needed a little work. I was able to find manual transmission cars with no A/C.

and automatic transmission cars with A/C, but I could not find my white whale of a manual trans with A/C.

In September of 2013, I was lucky enough to be able to purchase a very good condition 1978 Oldsmobile Starfire Firenza. It was an original car with very little done to it. It still had the original silver paint and dark carmine interior. It did not have A/C, but by that time I had given up on finding one with manual trans and A/C. As I found out later, it was a good thing I had given up on it as it appears that Olds did not offer A/C on a manual transmission Starfire with a V-8. Perhaps there just was not enough room under the hood.

Even though I had never been pulled over or even looked at askance by law enforcement when I drove either of my authentic plated



cars (usually if an officer noticed my car they would just grin and give me a thumbs up) it still made me a little nervous to drive either of them a lot. I decided that I would be driving the Starfire a lot and I should probably just put regular plates on it.

So at first it had just a regular license plate on it. Then when my plates were due up in January I got a vanity plate that read "7D8 OLDS" (I tried for 78 OLDS, but the SOS said that the combination of two numbers and four letters were reserved for disabled veteran plates or some such group, but I thought my alternate selection fairly clever). I had bought an authentic plate somewhere since I had bought the car, this would be a Michigan US Bicentennial plate with a 1978 registration sticker on it, and thought "well, maybe someday I'll want to change the plate to an authentic plate", but I really didn't think I would ever do it.

My mom had died in 2010 and our whole family missed her a lot, but nobody missed her more than my dad. In March of 2013 he had purchased his first classic Oldsmobile, a 1949 98 Deluxe 4-door. The car helped fill part of the void that my mom's passing had created in his life (and it has a great story of its very own).

In late March of 2014, I was in my father's basement making sure the charge on the battery for his 98 was good as we were planning on putting it back in the car soon. I was getting ready to head back upstairs when something on a shelf at my eye level by the stairs caught my eye. It was a Michigan US Bicentennial plate, so out of curiosity I pulled it down and looked at it through all the dust collected on it and noticed it was all numbers. "Oh", I thought, "a trailer plate". Not much good unless I was going to register an old trailer and I'm not even sure that you can do that. Then I noticed that I had picked up not one, but two plates. I looked at the one beneath and it was a car plate with a 1978 sticker on it. I turned it over and on the back, in my mom's handwriting on a piece of masking tape were the words "Alan's 1978 First Plate". The plate I had on my first 1968 Cutlass. For reasons unknown to me, my mother, who to my knowledge did not save license plates, had thought to save a license plate that could actually be used on one of my classic Oldsmobiles. A car that she would never have known that I was even interested in. So last month I made a copy of the plate and sent it in with my proof of insurance and a check for \$35, and I now have my car registered with my authentic plate, all thanks to Mom.
