Apparently the "correct" way to fix a road that is falling apart is to drive a dump truck full of cold patch down it and have workers throw a couple of shovelfuls into the pot holes. Then the cars are supposed to drive over it and "pat" it down. This leaves a bunch of "outies" in the place of the potholes and the road is in no better shape than it was before, not to mention that the cold patch just starts coming out after a week or two and there the hole is, bigger and badder than before (it does provide job security for the cold patch crews). My fear is that

I am all for reconstructing our roads. I am even willing to spend more of my money to have it done. I just do not want to spend it on doing it the same way we have been, which doesn't seem to last. I believe we all know what the definition of "crazy" is. Another thing concerns me about the 1% tax increase. We have seen it in the past. The Lottery. The money from the Lottery was supposed to go to the schools. Seemed like a great idea. We all voted for it. The Lottery was instituted. The schools got the money from the Lottery. But then they took much of the General Fund money that had been going to the schools and started spending it elsewhere. The net result was the schools ended up with about the same amount of funding as they had before the Lottery. There is nothing to stop this from happening again with the roads. Once the extra 1% is coming in, the money that is currently being used to fix roads could easily be re-routed to some legislators' favorite pork pie project. I'm also concerned about what I've been hearing about the 1% being used for "transportation", not "road repair". I'm sure you've heard about the \$10 million that was spent

refurbishing old passenger rail cars. They are now sitting on a siding waiting for the rail part of the project to get finished. The projected time for that to be finished is 2 years. You all work on cars. What's that rule of thumb? Take the projected time to do a project and triple it. So by the time the rail system is ready (I believe it is for a rail system to run between Howell and Ann Arbor? Really? Is that really needed anyway?) The cars will have been sitting there for at least 6 years. At that point they will probably need another refurbishment. There's 10 million dollars down the drain that could have been used for road repair, spent on a project that might never get done, and even if it does get done will probably only serve a handful of people. Have you ever looked at a SEMTA bus as it goes by? It seems that most of the ones that I see have about 3 riders on them. I swear it would probably be more cost effective to scuttle the bus service and use the money spent on it to buy those people cars and insurance.

My point in writing this is to ask you to please look into the details of this proposal before voting on it. Also write to your representatives in Lansing and the governor telling them that you demand full transparency in what is going to happen with the new funds, and what is happening with the current funds. We need to make sure they don't rob Peter to pay Paul like they did with the school funding, and we need to make sure that we start constructing and repairing our roads the correct way, not the cheap, fast way. Also if you are voting "No" on the proposal, let them know why you are voting "No".





MEMBERS GARAGE......

From Dan Evans, part 2:

I began tapping and poking at the sheet metal on the floor. Some areas were weak, while others were still amazingly strong. By the end of the night there were several spots ranging from 2-4 inches that were now holes! I told Dave to remove all of the bad metal and we would put a section, or even a complete floor in it. He sadly agreed, and I could only imagine what was going through his mind. I would have been kicking myself after buying what should have been a top of the line 442.

A few days passed and Dave called me to let me know the rest of the floor was solid and he removed the gas tank as well. Only the section we were working on was damaged. I again stopped by. We played around and started cutting sheet metal away until we hit nice thick solid steel. The damage stopped about an inch from the gas tank brace on the left side. I told Dave, the best way to fix it was to make the repair from the far left where the trunk floor was factory welded to the trunk extension panel, to the center of the gas tank brace. This would conceal any repair and make it strong as well.

So I began cutting and removing what had to go. Dave had already purchased the replacement sheet metal, so had a template to use and a guide to stop by. The cuts had to be precise, and you can always remove more if needed. Putting back an "oops" is always tough. Dave had a good collection of "shop toys" as I do – between the both of us, anything could be fixed!



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
